
1 in 3 Perth-Huron residents utilize at least one of the associated agencies, programs or projects, making the United Way Perth-Huron important to all.

The Next Step Action Centre

"We can't fix their journey but we can help facilitate it".

Jane is a single mother of two who used to work for FRAM. When the plant closed, Jane had no idea what she was going to do. Today she is working at half the wage, trying to pay the bills and juggle family life. Making ends meet was impossible at the lower wage, so Jane has taken a second job in retail and is considering a third. Meanwhile, her children barely see her. Stress is mounting.

While many of us are fortunate to have good paying jobs, a growing number of people in our region are struggling more than ever. Some call this phenomenon "the rise of the working poor". Every day Jane and others like her face financial, emotional and health challenges because of the pressure. As unemployment rates appear stable (and comparatively low to other regions), food bank line-ups, requests for membership subsidies at the YMCA, and other services are experiencing increasing demand. Simultaneously, Ontario Works Cases, although not as high as they were in the height of the recession, are not reducing to pre-recession levels.

What does all this mean for our community and the United Way? In 2012-2013 it meant that UWPH supported FRAM and Spartech workers via the storefront "Next Step Action Centre", helping them to find their next job or education opportunity and to offer information about local support services. Jane is one of those people, and while she has not yet found employment at the level she needs, her story aptly demonstrates the need for programs like the Next Step Action Centre.

Since opening in June, The centre has worked with many individuals helping them identify and find their "next step" in life. Of the 219 people who were let go from FRAM, so far 78% have moved on to new employment, retraining or retirement because of the Next Step.



Jim Watson, former Fram employee said "...(I) got a phone call from the gals at Next Step, telling me that a local employer was looking for tow-motor drivers. We set up an appointment for the next morning and they helped me tweak my resume and delivered it directly to the employer! (You) can't ask for anything more than that!...with the bad hand we have been dealt, you don't have to do this alone....".

The staff at The Next Step knows first-hand what their clients are faced with because they too worked at FRAM. In addition to offering technical knowledge and support, the staff offers understanding and compassion for the people they serve. Clients are welcomed into the office by familiar faces who already know a part of their story.

What's New With Our Divisions And Projects



Community Impact Committee

This year, the Community Impact Committee conducted 20 community engagement sessions across Perth and Huron Counties surveying a variety of people with the intention of gaging what issues are important to them and what role they see the United Way Perth-Huron playing in the future of their communities. As the Board of Directors sets the new Strategic Directions for the UWPH, this information will give them insight into what the citizens of Perth and Huron value.



SRPC

In April of 2013, the Social Research and Planning Council (SRPC) published Opening the Door: A Report on Violence Against Women in Perth and Huron Counties. This study gathered available information related to the prevalence of violence against women and the services available in Perth and Huron Counties in order to identify any service gaps that may exist as well as make recommendations. A report focusing on Volunteerism has recently been commissioned and will be published in the fall of 2013.



211

211 is the information and referral service that provides the people of Ontario with reliable information on community and social services. When you dial the 211 hotline, you are connected with a Certified Information and Referral Specialist who has been trained to assess your needs, answer your questions accurately, and advise you about the services and programs that are best for you and your loved ones.



The United Centre

The United Centre hosts a number of tenants who are supported by the United Way by receiving subsidized rent and/or shared services. 2012 tenant agencies included, Habitat for Humanity, Facile Perth, Blankets for Canada, Leads, Rogers TV, The Centre for Employment and Learning and this year we welcomed, the Stratford Symphony Orchestra and Stratford City Centre.



Volunteer Portal

Volunteer Portal connects interested people to volunteer opportunities in the community.



Youth United Council

The Youth United Council awarded two grants to youth led projects in 2012. The Stratford Youth Centre ran a program called Express Yourself which organized art classes aimed to help youth express themselves. South Huron District High School used their grant money to support a mental health and wellness program in their school.





A work force and community attraction project to help connect unemployed persons with opportunities in North Perth.



Avonova Click

A pilot project which hopes to improve digital literacy by providing computers and internet access to low income members of the community in Stratford.



The Local Community Food Centre

On November 22, 2012, The Local Community Food Centre officially opened its doors, inviting community members to come together to grow, share, prepare, access and advocate good food for everyone! An energetic evening started off with a ribbon cutting ceremony after which everyone sat down together for an amazing meal. The event culminated in a powerful discussion where people who participated in a \$5 per day food budget challenge shared their insights along with community members who experience food insecurity as part of their daily lives.



Training-4-Success and PF Solutions

Training-4-Success aims to generate revenue to support the Perth-Huron Practice Firm (PF Solutions). They currently deliver upwards of 140 interactive workshops and classes and have departments that serve customers with remote administrative assistance and bookkeeping services. The Practice Firm continues as an innovative, no-fee, business office work experience program where participants gain knowledge in office skills, job search skills and employability skills through a learn-by-doing approach. This year the practice firm has successfully transitioned from virtual business to actual community-based business by providing office support for Training-4-Success. Within the last twelve months, 23 practice firm participants have secured gainful employment within Huron-Perth.



Forever Fund

Forever Fund is the permanent endowment fund of the United Way Perth-Huron. When money is donated to the Forever Fund, it is invested and the principal is preserved. Only the income earned is used to support essential services and programs, ensuring that the gift will benefit future generations.

When we took on the 2012 Campaign, we had no idea the impact that United Way Perth-Huron has on our 2 counties. We did not know the number of people who rely on services such as Shelterlink, Huron Women's Shelter or the Emily Murphy Centre as a day to day necessity for existence; or that others may need the services of a local food bank just to survive until their next pay cheque arrives. We learned that the need in our communities varies from person to person, but that need is there, that need is real.

The response to the 2012 campaign was inspirational! Our goal was \$1,082,012 and we hit \$1,082,651! That is the largest amount ever raised in Perth and Huron! 
Give
